

After 9 years of dedicated service as a nurseaid at the Craftsbury Community Care Center, Cathy Wilder has retired. She lives in Albany with her husband, and has a son in Barton, two sons, a daughter and a granddaughter in south Florida where she lived before moving to Vermont.

Prior to being a nurse-aid for the Center, Cathy volunteered and still does, here and elsewhere. She also serves as a town lister for the town of Albany.

As a member of *Mouses and Spouses*, a community service group, Cathy has helped put on some lively events at CCCC over the years. One such was a Hawaiian Luau that included a novel rendition of a hula danced to Don Ho's 'Tiny Bubbles'. Cathy reminisces about wearing her grass skirt and says she is ready to do it again as soon as the opportunity arrives.

In the fall, the group holds an auction at the Center where the residents get a fistful of play dollars to bid on donated objects. Cathy enjoys watching the residents be frugal with their play-money. For many frugality grew from hard lessons learned as a farmer's wife.

When Cathy reflected on her work at the Center she said she enjoyed the 2pm to 10pm shift best because she would dress up in fun, bright clothes and put funny things on her head. As dinner time fell during this shift, Cathy said she enjoyed playing music, and dancing during the dinner hour.

Another of her projects was the annual New Year's Eve celebration which she wrote about: "I worked New Year's ever since my first year when one of the residents came to me bemoaning the fact there was no New Year's Eve party to attend. That got me thinking. So, that first year it was a few residents gathering on the front porch. I served champagne (ginger ale) in wine glasses with some Glenn Miller on the phonograph, 7-8 pm. The 2nd year I had a Guy Lombardo CD with noise makers and party hats; trying to replicate a night club. I would turn the clock ahead so 'midnight' came around 7pm. It worked pretty well. Each year I tried to improve. One year Linda Scott found a lighted ball I rigged on a hook so we can count down to midnight, then the ball drops followed by the playing of Auld Lang Syne by Guy Lombardo and his Royal Canadians. The ginger ale eventually was replaced with sparkling cider and champagne. Many hands go into making it a special evening and a good time is had by all. And we're all in bed well before 12am!"

Cathy said she frequently felt she received much more from the residents than she was able to give. She plans to continue her volunteer work at the Craftsbury Community Care Center. "You haven't seen the last of me". Good luck, Cathy, and we look forward to seeing you around.

Exercise **really** can be fun as well as beneficial. CCCC frequently sponsors activities which the public are encouraged to attend but *Bone Builders* is the most popular by far. Mondays and Thursdays from 10:00 to 11:00 CCCC residents and community members gather to participate in this exercise program. Debbie Kasper and Cathie Wilkinson, with additional help from Renee Wahler, lead the group through their familiar routine. Mary Jane Dexter and Marianne Weaver pitch in when called upon. Following a warm-up of stretches, the class does a series of weight bearing and balance oriented movements.



In 2005, Kristin Urie, then Director of Resident Activities at CCCC, applied to the Council on Aging and received a grant to begin the *Bone Builders* program. Kristin realized that both residents and the community at large could benefit from exercises that would strengthen their muscles and in turn would strengthen their bones, helping to prevent osteoporosis. An additional component focused on increasing balance to avoid falls. A research program at Tufts University initiated the original idea for this series of exercises. It was administered through the Retired Senior Volunteer Program

(RSVP) in Morrisville and that office provided all the training for the class leaders.

While the program was targeted for those living at CCCC, the community was invited to participate and it did enthusiastically. Currently the vast majority of the class comes from the local neighborhoods of Greensboro, Craftsbury, Wolcott, and Glover. During the winter there are about a dozen regular attendees and the number grows to almost double in the summer. Bone Builders is a free program and all ages are welcome.
